UO SEX INVESTIGATION Varying accounts of incident stymie case

The DA explains his decision not to charge three basketball players

A female college student who said she was sex-ually assaulted by three University of Oregon bas-kethal players after a party earlier this year did not appear to be forced into or unable to con-sent to the sexual activity. Lane County District Attorney Alex Gardner said in a lengthy state-ment released Tuesday afternoon. The alleged victim's account is inconsistent with witnesses' and the players' accounts, Gard-ner said in explaining his decision not to bring charges against Damyean Dotson, Dominic Artis and Brandon Austin. She told police she would have been able to better articulate that she did not want to engage in any sexual activity with the players had she not been so intoxicated, accord-ing to a Eugene police report released on Mon-Dotson, 49, Artis, 19, and Austin, 18, were in-vestigated by Eugene police after the March in-
